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Being the Church in the World

Being the Church in the World

A few months ago I found a resource from the South Central Synod of Wisconsin offering devotions for church councils. The words in the reflection for May written by Pastor Robb Kosky, an interim pastor in the Milwaukee Area Synod, were a good reminder for me of what it means for us to be the church in the world. You may find his words insightful as well.

TEXT:

I give you a new commandment, that you love one another just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you have love for one another. - John 13:34-35 **REFLECTION**

Love is underestimated. Love is unappreciated. Love is dismissed and explained away.

Love is diminished – reduced to what we say we love – like bar-b-que potato chips, root beer, this music, that car, the Packers, or the Cubs.

Love is misunderstood. And this makes sense because God is love, and who among us fully understands God; because Jesus calls us to love and shows us the way, and who among us really wants to fall in behind Jesus and take up our cross and follow.

No. We explain away the love of Jesus and the way of the cross. We do not wish to deny ourselves, to sell all that we own, to love our enemies, to remove the log from our own eye, to say "Father, forgive them..." We do not wish to drop our stone and walk away (for ours is no doubt a righteous stone).

Jesus has told us and shown us what love is, and we who are Jesus' followers still, after 2000 years, have trouble understanding and loving as Jesus loved us.

(Of course, we do love. We have lots of love and even self-giving love, and sometimes, some of us in the Church attain to a strength of love that most of us can barely fathom. But if I love those who love me, of what credit is that, and I know that most of my love is for those who love me also, and for those whom I can relate to and understand and agree with. But when I am honest with myself, I can see and feel the limits of my love, and I know that I do not love as Jesus loves.)

Because love is so misconstrued and so difficult, and so little practiced in our world, our world is in desperate need of the love of Jesus. And this is why we, who are the Church, must love. Must try to love, even when we are not very good at it. We must do the difficult work of learning to love as we have been loved, of learning to forgive and accept as we have been forgiven and accepted.

This is why I believe that... (and you can fill in the blank here):

- Black lives matter. Because people who are black must be loved.
- Police lives matter. Because people who are police must be loved.
- Immigrants matter. Because I am called to love people who are immigrants and why they left, or how they arrived, or what language they speak does not change my call to love them.
- LGBTQIA+ people matter. Because my call to love others has absolutely nothing to do with a person's sexual identity or orientation or self-expression, and whether I do or do not understand it does not change my call to love.
- Republicans, Democrats, etc., matter. Because love has nothing to do with agreeing with others.
- People who have experienced the hatred of this world matter, AND
- People who have perpetrated hatred in this world matter. Because I am called to love as Jesus loves and through that love bring healing to people who are broken in this world.

I do not understand how to do all of this. But I do believe that the Church is in the world to love the world and make the love of Jesus known.

PRAYER

Lord Jesus, send me your Spirit that I might stretch the limits of my love. Help me to love others as you have loved me. Amen



Congrats to the 2024 Graduates - During the May 19th Worship the Graduates were recognized and offered a quilt. There was a Celebration in honor of the graduates.











June Noisy Bucket - Waushara Canine Crime unit

This month, we're honored to highlight the Waushara Canine Crime Unit and their exceptional service in combating crime with the help of their loyal K9 companions. Something that you may not be aware of is that nearly all of the cost for our county's K-9's comes from fundraising and are sponsored by Waushara County's Crimestoppers. One of the largest fundraisers is the Jailbreak Marathon (scheduled for September 28, 2024) with all proceeds going to the program. The cost can be substantial. Some of these costs associated to support our dogs include:

Cost for one K-9 and initial handler training - \$17,000.

Cost of equipment needed for patrol-\$39,000.

Cost of food and vet care for one year - \$5,000

Cost of community support and encouragement- PRICELESS

Waushara's K-9 squad consists of three dogs. First up is the senior K-9, "Argo". K-9 Argo is a male German Shepard born on January 22, 2012 in Germany. He traveled to the United States from Germany to further his education. Argo studied at the SteinigTal Kennel in Campbellsport, WI. He has a double major; trained in both patrol and narcotics. K-9 Argo also studied tracking, narcotics detection, handler protection, apprehension, as well as building and area searches. It was at the SteinigTal Kennel in the fall of 2013 where Argo met his handler who is now Sheriff Walter Zuehlke (the only Sheriff in WI that is a K-9 Handler). When not on patrol, K-9 Argo is considered a member of Sheriff Zuehlke's family and resides at home with him.

The next K-9 is Thor, and like the God of Thunder he is poised to bring the hammer down while on the job. K-9 Thor is a pure-bred male German Shepard. K-9 Thor was born on Christmas in Ehringshausen, Hesse, Germany in 2016. At only 1 year of age Thor traveled to the United States on January 30, 2018. K-9 Thor, like Argo decided to continue his education and was also trained at Steinig Tal Kennel in Campbellsport, WI. K-9 Thor began training with his handler, Deputy Brian Wenzel in the spring of 2018. K-9 Thor is a certified dual purpose K-9, trained in narcotics detection, tracking, handler protection, apprehension, and building and area searches. K-9 Thor is a member of Deputy Wenzel's family and resides at home with Deputy Wenzel when not on duty.

And last but certainly not least, the new K-9 on the street is K-9 Storm. He is a Belgian Malinois. He was born on Oct. 17, 2017. Unlike Argo and Thor, Storm was raised and trained near Toronto, Canada at Working K-9 kennel. He began his training with his handler, Sgt. Scott Eagan in the fall of 2019. He is a certified dual purpose K-9, trained in narcotics detection, tracking, handler protection, apprehension, and building and area searches. K-9 Storm is a member of Sgt. Eagan's family and resides with him at home when not on duty. All of the K-9's, Sheriff Zuehlke and his deputies are members of WLECHA, the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Canine Handler Association. Synod Hearings on Draft Social Statement, "Civic Life and Faith," Scheduled

The ELCA is developing a social statement on civic life and faith, the relationship of church and state, and related matters, as called for by the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

Social statements are the ELCA's primary documents to address significant social issues. They are intended to aid reflection, shape conscience and set forth the ELCA's teaching and policy on the major social issues and questions of contemporary life. Social statements are developed by task forces, using an established process of study and widespread participation across the church to guide theological and moral deliberation.

At this time the task force encourages you to study and give feedback on a <u>draft version of the social statement</u>. You can participate by filling out a survey, <u>found here</u>, or by participating in one of the hearings offered in our synod. Hearings are public gatherings where participants share their specific affirmations or concerns about a draft statement. The feedback period will be open until Sept. 30, 2024.

Notes from the 2024 Synod Assembly

On May 17 and 18, 2024, I attended the East Central Synod of Wisconsin (ECSW) synod assembly along with Linda Reetz and Terry Wallace from Grace. In addition to the 240 voting members of the assembly, we were joined by several ministry partners. Throughout the assembly, we were inspired by proclamation moments with people sharing their earliest memories of Jesus and how the good news of God in Christ Jesus has shaped their lives.

The plenary speaker was the Rev. Kerri Parker from the Wisconsin Council of Churches. She talked about the challenge of being church in an election year, how to keep going when we're afraid, and the importance of knowing our why because it informs the what and how of who we are as a church and what we do.

We received greetings from the Rev. Dr. Phil Hirsch on behalf of the Churchwide expression of the ELCA. Pastor Hirsch highlighted various ways that we as a church are working together to share the love of Jesus - through the work of Lutheran Disaster Response, World Hunger, missionaries, Young Adults in Global Mission, Bible Camps, and more. One thing that stood out to me in his presentation was the number of pastoral vacancies throughout the ELCA and the significant decline in seminary enrollment over the last 5 years. Rev. Hirsch lifted up the importance of identifying leaders for the future of the church and spoke about alternative ways of raising up leaders for the church.

We heard an update from Crossways Camping Ministries with a huge thank you to everyone who is supporting them financially and blessing them with gifts.

We heard from Hector Colon, the president of Lutheran Social Services with an update on their ministry. An anonymous supporter of LSS has issued a challenge to congregations to increase their support of LSS by 10% this year and this individual will match the increase.

This year is the 50th anniversary of the ELCA World Hunger. We heard about several projects that are being funded by grants from ELCA World Hunger including an exciting housing project in Door County.

Some of the business stuff of the assembly included approving the Compensation Guidelines for 2025, approving the synod budget for 2025, elections for the synod council, the committee on discipline, and voting members who will attend the churchwide assembly in 2025.

Five resolutions were considered and approved. These included a resolution to increase congregational support for ELCA World Hunger, a commitment to utilize study resources on racism and discrimination, education and advocacy for peace in the Holy land, approving voice and vote for TEEM Candidates who are serving congregations. More information on each of teh resolutions can be found on the Synod website at ECSW.org.

During the break times, we also had the opportunity to visit the information tables of several ministry partners including Lutheran Social Services; ELCA World Hunger and Good Gifts; the Lay School of Ministry; Synod Youth Board; UWO Gathering Place; and more.

Milestones were also recognized at the assembly for both pastors and congregations. I was recognized for 20 years of ministry and First Lutheran was recognized and celebrated for 150 years of ministry.

The Assembly can be long but it is also inspiring to see what we can do when churches work together. Next year the assembly will be one day in Green Bay on June 7. Consider being a participant.


